



About the Survey

The results inform our advocacy efforts, as well as resources offered by CAEH. We are grateful to communities for taking the time to share these insights and for all they are doing to support the health and wellbeing of our homeless neighbours.

Number of participating communities to date: **31**




Isolation & Quarantine Shelters

Nearly all participating communities have an isolation & quarantine shelter/model for individuals experiencing homelessness. These have been organized in motels/hotels, community spaces, schools, and other locations that allow for appropriate cohorting and accommodations.



% of participating communities w/ I&Q shelters: **90%**

Sustaining I&Q shelters and models is challenging for communities, due to limited resources, increasing pressures, and the unpredictable future of the pandemic. The majority of communities have shared that they are unable to sustain their current model past 3-4 months. Only communities from the Atlantic provinces indicated they can sustain for longer than 6 months.

The primary challenge for communities sustaining I&Q shelters is the ongoing availability of space. As economies reopen, spaces that have been used for temporary I&Q sites are beginning to shift back to their original use.





While the number of isolation and quarantine shelters have remained relatively stable over the last two weeks, a number of communities report that use of these beds has increased. All of the communities reporting an increase in use are from Ontario, where the number of cases remains relatively higher than other participating provinces and territories.



Outbreaks & Testing

Diagnostic testing continues to be a critical part of confronting, delaying and stopping the spread of COVID-19. This is particularly true for individuals experiencing homelessness, who are often living in congregate settings and aren't always able to practice good hygiene, such as hand-washing.

Communities that are increasing surveillance and universal testing are proactively preventing outbreaks in emergency shelters.




Recovery & Second-wave

While the recovery phase and a potential second wave are unpredictable and difficult to prepare for, communities have moved forward with developing and documenting strategies and plans. However, results demonstrate that communities still have considerable work to do in this area.

It's almost important to note that the following percentage of communities have **not** engaged individuals with lived/living experience in the development of these plans and strategies:







Sector Health

As part of this survey, a number of questions were asked of participating communities to understand the state of the sectors health. Like most others, the homeless sector was ill-prepared for the speed in which the pandemic impacted its client population and general operations. While the lack of significant outbreaks within shelters and encampments is evidence of well the sector has responded, it has taken a toll on the sectors overall health.



