





### Homelessness in the District Pandemic, Poverty and Housing Crises Impacts:

- 320% increase in housing applications on the KDSB wait list since 2011 (1,332 approved in July 2022)
- Housing becoming increasingly unaffordable and unattainable
- Poverty levels for children, unemployment and Core Housing needs are increasing and are amongst the highest in Ontario and Canada.

# Homelessness Support Services in Sioux Lookout

- Sioux Lookout Emergency Shelter:
  - 22 Shelter Beds
    - 24/7 Meals, Landry, Shower, and Warming Space
    - Service Hub
  - 16 Safe Sober Beds
  - 6 Non-Medical Withdrawal/Detox Beds

New / In Development

- Biidaabin Waakai'igan (A New Beginning)
  - 20 Units Supportive Housing Program




# Need for Addiction Treatment in Sioux Lookout

# Need for Addiction Treatment in Sioux Lookout

- 2003-2018: ED visits due to opioid use went from 12 to 62
  - > 417% increase
- 2019: 10 people hospitalized due to opioid use –
   9 deaths (6 males and 3 females)

As confirmed but believe numbers to be higher but recorded as cardiac or other.

### How It Came To Be: Addictions Treatment

- Sioux Lookout Friendship Accord Addiction Treatment Proposal for options available in our "HOME"
- Ministry of Health approved the funding
- Location and Service Provider selected
- Program delivery and expansion continues










### Addiction Treatment Program: Vision

- 8 Withdrawal/Detox Beds (non-medical)
- 24/7 RAAM Clinic onsite Phase 2
- Service Provider Office Space
- Multi Use/Purpose Community Meeting Room/Training Space
- 8 Thirty (30) Day Safe Sober Stay Residential Program Phase 3
- Cultural Outdoor Courtyard
- 1 Year Supportive Sober Living Home Phase 4


