- 525,000 people, 50% around St. John's
- Rural population highly distributed
- Innu, Inuit and Mi'kmaq communities and governments
- Services concentrated in St. John's



- Founded in 1990 after the Mr.
 Cashel closure
- Non-profit, registered charity
- Professional services agency

- 1600+ youth served annually
- 130+ staff members
- Multiple service, programming and housing sites

INTEGRATED SERVICE DELIVERY AT CFY


- · It (often) starts with food


