


REST: Unique Challenge of Black Youth Homelessness

- Black people form approximately 75% of our client base, whilst 6% identifies as Indigenous.
- 77% of our clients are female and 19% male
- 89% of our clients are aged between 18-24, with 7% aged 16-17.
- 35% are unemployed
- 41% earn less than \$10k per annum
- 46% of our clients have been unemployed for over 1 year.
- □ 45% of our clients are in high school and 42% are in post-secondary education.






