Intentions

Our intention is to **create a First Nations-led, informed, and adaptable data collection tool** that focuses on the area of houselessness within First Nations including those whose live off reserve.

- Culturally sensitive and trauma-informed
- Build meaningful and reciprocal relationships
- **Empower** First Nations communities to **advocate** for themselves

The outcome of this tool is to understand the scope of houselessness regarding First Nations communities.

Why a First Nation-specific project?



Literature Review & Environmental Scan

First Nations communities, especially those on reserves, are disadvantaged by Western and colonial methods of data collection.

Enumeration methods are informed by the federal government's definition of homelessness, which does not fully capture the experiences of First Nations and other Indigenous Peoples.

Phase 3: Reports & Reflection December -February 2024





HOW

WHAT: Grounded in principles of OCAP and data sovereignty, this initiative developed a survey based app titled, "Our Data Indigenous" that can easily be adapted to meet the needs and priorities of any community.

WHO

WHERE

WHO: This app was developed by Kitatipithitamak Mithwayawin (Cree for "sovereignty over our health") in collaboration with Indigenous partners, and an Advisory Council. WHY: The app was developed to address issues of access to data and help communities collect their own data that reflects local priorities that may relate to health, culture, environment or language.

> WHEN: The App launched in February 2021 and is now available to download for free on Google Play and the Apple Store.

WHERE: All Indigenous communities across Canada and around the world are welcome to join this initiative. HOW: Users can develop surveys on the App Dashboard Online and distribute the surveys in a number of different ways.

VERSATILE

The Our Data Indigenous App is adaptable to your needs.
Data can be collected on social information, land surveys, environmental monitoring, and much more!



ACCESSIBLE

The App is easy to use and can be downloaded on your personal device to access surveys wherever you are. It can even be used in areas with limited internet connectivity.



SECURE

All information gathered on the App is secure and can only be accessed with a unique login code. The App also uses participant codes to make survey participants responses anonymous.



RELEVANT

Collect survey data that is important to you and your community. Use the Our Data Indigenous App to better understand and respond to the needs and wellbeing of your community.
