Sectors in Silos



- Social Housing / Homelessness in silos
- Housing Resources at program level, not at a systems level
- Homelessness programs focusing efforts on market rent units, not maximizing subsidized units

Sectors in Silos

 Most affordable housing units were not targeted to people experiencing homelessness

 Coordinated Access development focused on access points; need housing resources lined up



You cannot end homelessness without housing.



Building a Coordinated Coalition


- ✓ People experiencing homelessness will touch various systems
- ✓ Coordinate resources and strategies
- ✓ Formalize collaboration and alignment between service providers and sectors

✓ Align as many cumulative as possible, and utilize them in a strategic and coordinated way



Lessons Learned in Coordinated Access

- 17% of individuals on the By-Name List applied to social housing
- 68 people on By-Name List received a social housing unit in 2 years
- Small number of people accessed health funded permanent supportive housing





Identifying Barriers

- Legislative barriers: past eviction, arrears, payment plans
- Updates to social housing application sent by mail (no fixed address)



 Front line staff not completing social housing applications because they don't see people experiencing homelessness receiving an offer



Removing Barriers

Use of Plan/Do/Study/Act Cycles to better understand the barriers

- PDSA: "Whatever it Takes"
- PDSA: Municipal-funded Supportive Housing
- PDSA: 100 day challenge

Trying to resolve barriers operationally was not enough



Strategic/Policy Alignment

- Align the definition of homelessness
- Aligning investments in housing resources with goal of ending chronic homelessness
- Making chronic homelessness a prioritized category for social housing
- Cross referencing BNL with social housing database



Success to Date

Any new investments in affordable housing will require a dedicated portion of their units to be allocated to the Coordinated Access Process

- 18 rent subsidies for new affordable housing building dedicated for people assigned through CA (Good Shepherd)
- 15 of 35 units of new supportive housing through YWCA Hamilton

Tentatively, 100% of Housing Allowances dedicated to Coordinated Access
