Edmonton Public Library

Urban public library with 21 locations. In 2018—

- 275,272 Edmontonians used their card
- 5.5 million in-person visits (and 9.9 million virtual visits)
- 11.3 million items borrowed

So how do vulnerable Edmontonians use the library?



Space

- A safe and (hopefully) welcoming space.
- (Comfortable) seating, tables, shelter from the elements
- Security: a blessing and a curse
- 9 AM 9 PM and early opening
- Bike locks
- Coming soon: lockers!



Digital Services

- Free, no-barrier Wi-Fi at all 21 locations
- Outlets and charging stations
- Public computers (827,530 hours)
- Support and training! (e.g., Google IT Certification)
- Lending ("We share")—
 - Chromebooks
 - Wi-Fi hotspots
 - Devices (e.g., radon screening kits, pedometers)



Makerspaces

- Multiple locations, largest downtown
- Creative outlets—
 - Digital gaming (solo and group)
 - Music, film, photography, art performance, recording, production
 - Technologies like vinyl cutter, laser cutter, 3D printers, robots, scanning/conversion, sewing machines, book machine
- And, support and training (of course!)



History

- Safe Communities Innovation Fund (Govt. of Alberta grant)
- 2011, three year pilot, \$630,000
- Social Return on Investment: \$3.56
 million in savings and/or reallocation of
 funds to society over a 20-month period


