


The Hope

- Housing is a human right and social good
- Without transforming systemic problems, the homeless-serving sector cannot independently end homelessness.
- Both **prevention and evidence-based responses** need to be in place, working hand-in-hand. And, prevention needs to occur at the micro, meso, and macro levels.

The Challenge

• Many frameworks or government plans/strategies already exist, however we approach this work unconstrained by timelines (ie. 4-year government cycles), budgets (what would it really take?), and politics.



Research Question

➤ What would it really take to prevent and end homelessness in Ontario, and subsequently in Canada?

- Positioning the policy challenge into context;
- Analyzing current policy within a theoretical context;
- Empirical engagement of localized knowledge.

The Process


➤ 70 key informant interviews — with lived experts, policy makers/deliverers, service providers, academics, activists/advocates




- ➤ Analyzed descriptively for content
- ➤ Interpretive analysis







