
Calls include: homelessness prevention and shelter diversion, service navigation, community referrals, and partner support



Homelessness prevention and shelter diversion

68% of callers who are calling for shelter access were supported with homelessness prevention or shelter diversion





Reasons for Shelter Access

This includes: relationship breakdowns, discharges from carceral institutions, individual from other regions, evictions, street sleeping, and refugee claimants.



Community Connections

This include: emergency shelters, safe housing, diverting to friends or family housing, home regions, transitional housing, housing resources, legal aid, immigration supports, financial supports

- B3 charitable organization providing transitional housing support services to youth (16-24) experiencing or at-risk of homelessness in Peel.
- Founded in 2015 by Dagma Koyi
- Mission: to help raise BIPOC youth out of Housing insecurity in Peel
- 13 FTEs
- Supports an average of 200 youth annually since 2021

Introducing a Shelter Diversion & Eviction Prevention Community of Practice

180 participants joined, 40-80 participants per call

Includes people involved in service provision, policy/planning/research/advocacy, funders, volunteers

Primarily homeless sector; also legal, mental health and substance use services

Community-based, provincial and national organizations

"...it's also nice to hear what's happening in different jurisdictions, even if you know people are still new and just trying things out. It's just nice to kind of have that environmental scan of what's happening in different areas."
