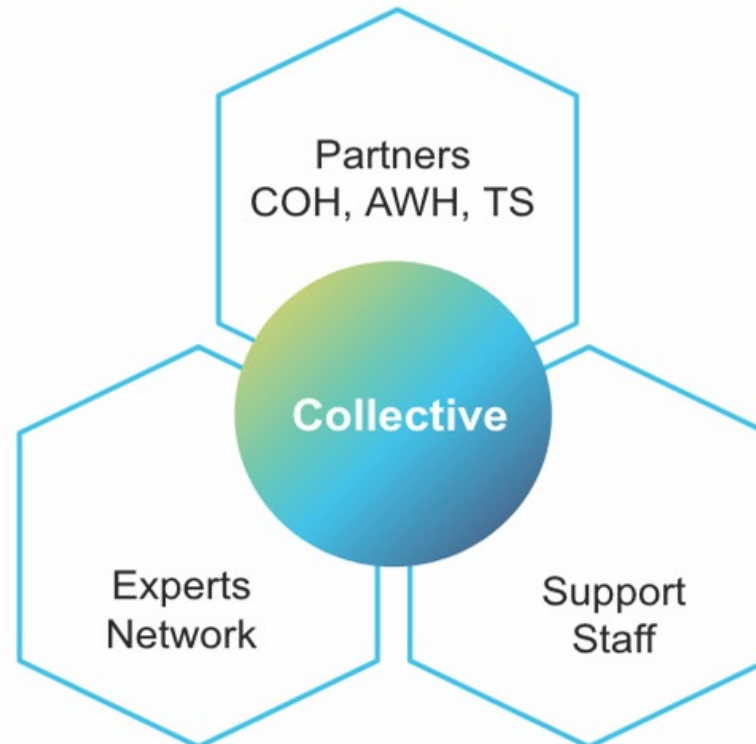

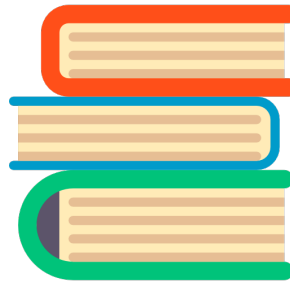


# REACHING HOME & SPC: BUILDING SYSTEMS PLANNING CAPACITY

Federal investment to advance evidence-based solutions to homelessness using a systems planning approach by:



**Systems Mapping support & technical assistance** to support communities & organizations using HelpSeeker.org platform.



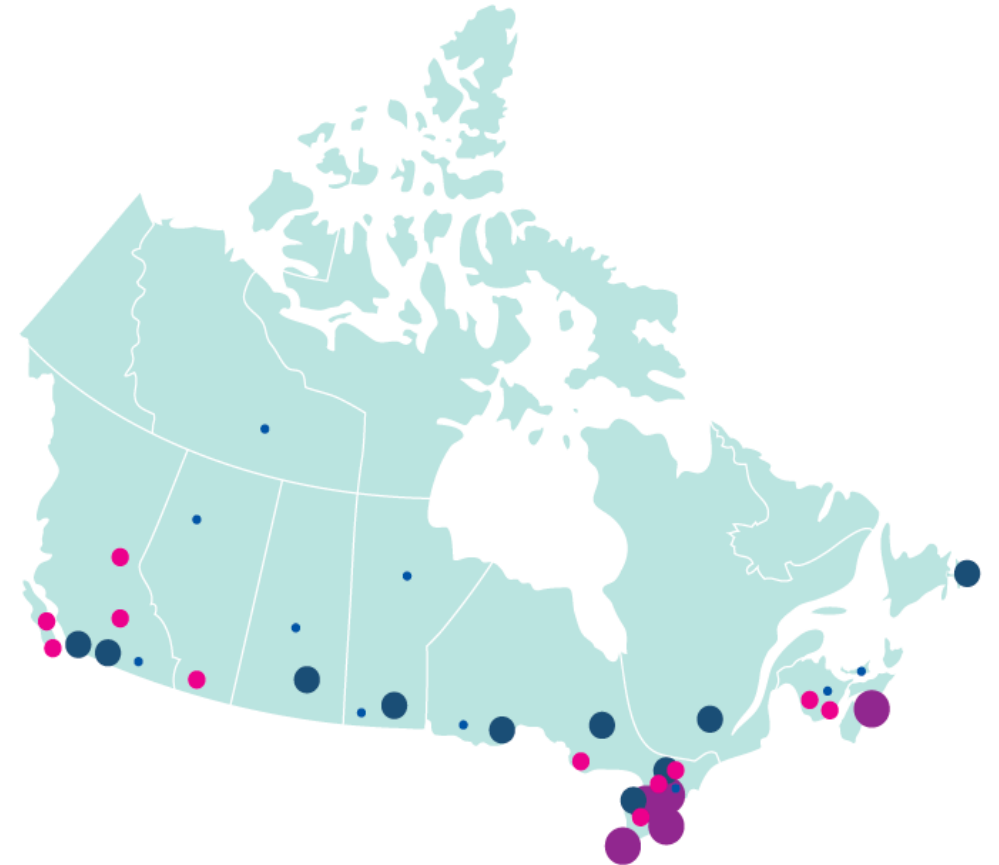
**Training and resources** to enhance the capacity of individuals engaged in systems planning activities.



**Systems Planning National Experts Network** to enhance community of practice and review approaches and tools.

# PURPOSE OF COMMUNITY SYSTEMS PLANNING NEEDS ASSESSMENT

- Conducted **needs assessment** of CAB/CEs & Housing and Social Service Stakeholders
- Increasing need to **engage systems and sectors beyond** typical stakeholders
- Reaching Home recognizes need to engage public systems, private sector, and other players that can help prevent homelessness and sustained exits



# THEME 1: VARIANCE IN STAGE/DEPTH OF PLANNING EFFORTS

- While some communities are **further along** in coordinating efforts and systems planning
- Those that have planning groups: require **technical support** and enhanced **resources** to advance work
- Common challenge: having dedicated **funding and staffing resources** to carry work forward



## THEME 2: SUPPORT NEEDED TO MOVE FROM SYSTEM PLANNING TO SYSTEMS PLANNING

- How to **identify roles of other systems** and the need for coordination and planning between them
- Those on the ground may be less aware of how their work ties in...but they can have a significant role in operationalizing a **coordinated systems approach!**



## THEME 3: GREATER DIVERSITY & ALIGNMENT BETWEEN STAKEHOLDERS NEEDED

- Need support identifying and including right players in **public systems** and others **outside of sector**
- Majority believed there was **little to no engagement** with: justice (55%), health (60%), child welfare (61%), and education (66%) systems



## THEME 4: DATA NEEDS ARE SIGNIFICANT

- 40% of CAB/CE respondents did not have reliable real-time data
- 20% of CAB/CE respondents stated community had data collection in place to assess homelessness trends locally
- Even with formalized and comprehensive data collection, communities need assistance harnessing data to drive policy and systems change



## THEME 5: CHALLENGES TO MOVE BEYOND ADDRESSING CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS

- Systems planning serves as **cost-effective upstream approach** that responds to those experiencing risk of homelessness
- Systems need to be retooled to identify and mitigate individual risk factors for homelessness, responding with an **immediate and appropriate** matching of **services and supports**

Participants have identified needing more technical support, training, and resources around these priority areas.

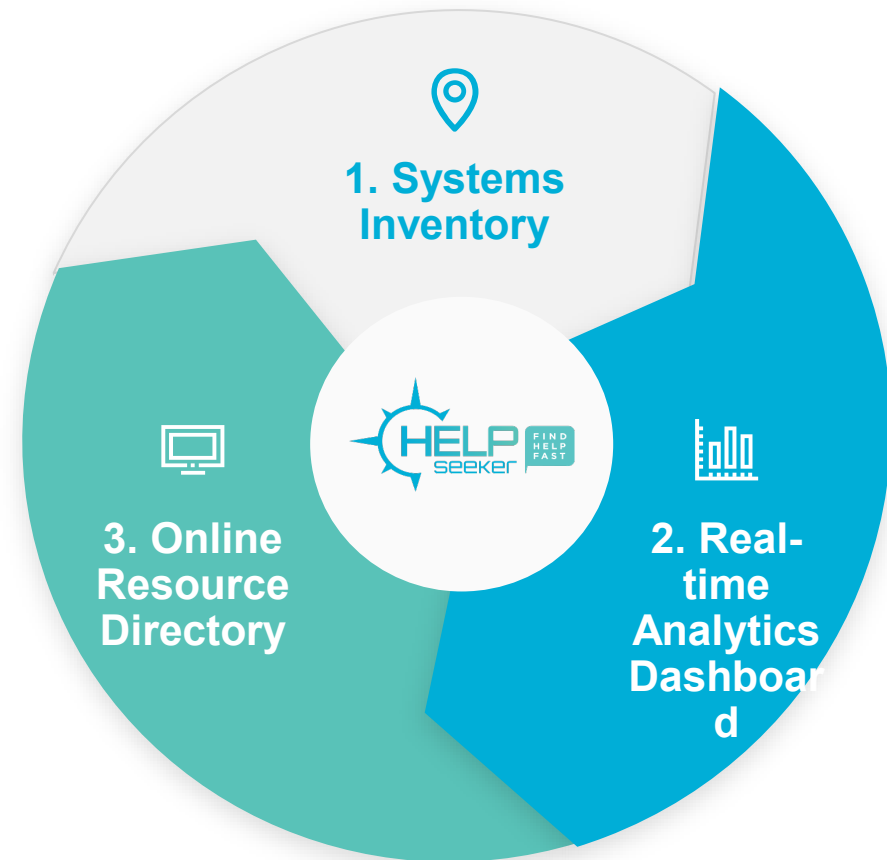

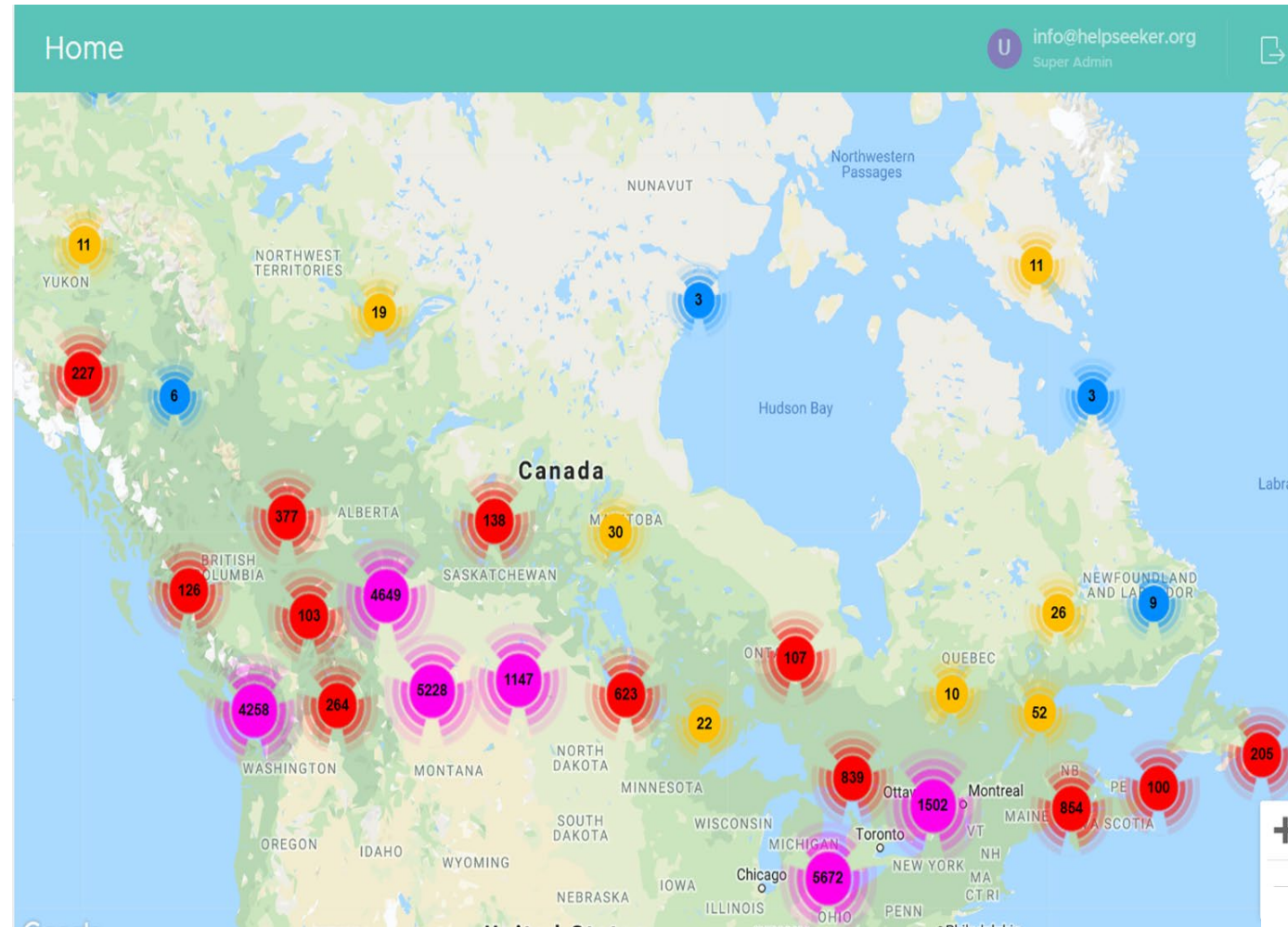
- HelpSeeker.org is a **systems mapping platform** integral to our systems change approach.

# The Change Imperative

In 2017, Canadians invested **\$280 billion dollars** in safety net services delivered by charities via taxpayer dollars (70%) or donations (30%).

We estimate, this goes to fund more than **250,000** different services operating in Canada's social safety net.

- **Despite our efforts, and hundreds billions spent:**
- People report they don't know where and how to **get the right help** when they need it
- Social/health challenges, including **homelessness/addictions/trauma/abuse** are changing faster, becoming harder to manage with old approaches
- Public demands for **accountability/action** from governments have intensified
- Better knowledge about what works is not implemented at scale, not keeping up with **velocity of change**

# Reaching Home (RH) Directives

**Reaching Home provides communities with funding to deliver supports & coordinated systems plans to achieve community goals to prevent/end homelessness**

- Over the next 3 years, communities will be tasked to develop **Coordinated Access (CA)** locally in alignment with RH Directives.
- **Mapping of services**, benefits, resources in local social support systems is encouraged to support this direction.
- New systems-driven **Community Plans** will be required (2019-2029) with annual updates/performance management.
- A focus on prevention & systems planning leveraging **real-time data** to inform funding/service

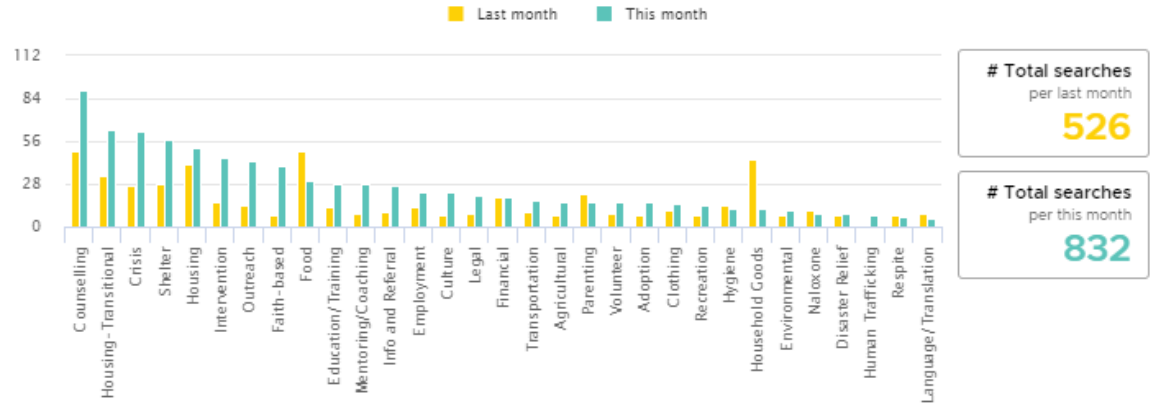

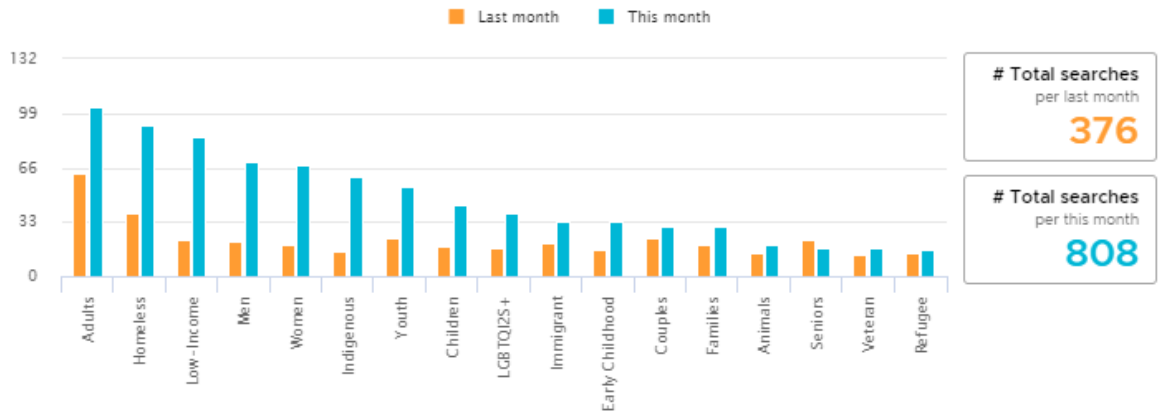

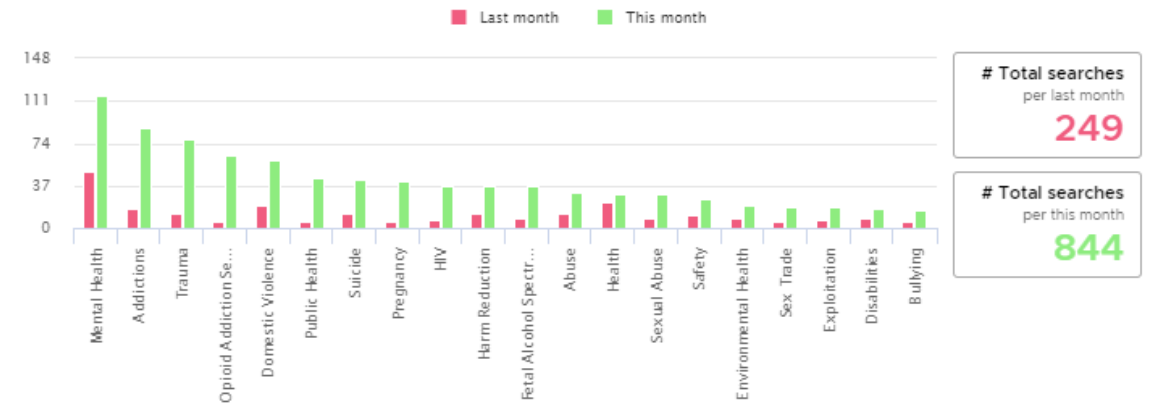

## What Does Systems Mapping Involve?

- Up-to-date **resource directory** for all services available for those at risk/homeless in community
- **Categorization** of all programs by target population, geographical scope, service focus.
- **Mapping of locations** to discern location patterns
- **Real-time occupancy** report to show what spaces are available in services

## What Does Systems Mapping Involve?

- Clear **eligibility criteria**, access/referral process for those looking for help.
- **Feedback loop** from clients/users of services to each of the resources.
- **Performance indicators** to track community demand and feedback on services & **return on investment**.

## Our Learnings On Systems Change

- Developing **systems mapping** as a rigorous practice, with standards, processes, QA and a tech platform.
- Understanding how big the **social safety net** really was in numbers & dollars by developing the “Social Impact Audit” approach.
- Making the connection between **public, private and non-profit sectors** in the safety net.
- Developing a process for **Integrated Coordinated Access** and implementing it with Early Adopter communities.
- The insights from **Big Data** we now have at our fingertips with machine learning; mind-boggling.

# Our Learnings On Systems Change

- **Change is hard.** Even if we think we want it. Sometimes it's easier to do nothing.
- Systems disruption sounds cool as a concept, but **not everyone is ready** for it.
- What we think we know, and what the data shows are not always congruent. The challenge is being open to the conversation.
- Technology has set the pace of change at **breakneck speeds**; especially those of us in the tech business.
