

The Keys Young Report 5 types of Aboriginal Homelessness

- 1) Spiritual homelessness (separation from land/family)
- 2) Overcrowding (a hidden form of homelessness)
- 3) Relocation and transient homelessness.
- 4) Escaping an unsafe or unstable home
- 5) Lack of access to any stable shelter

Community Consultation

4 Levels of Consultation

- 1) The National Steering Committee
- 2) Regional Advisors Committee, began Sept 12.
- 3) Consultation with Elders
- 4) Town Hall

Realigning Our Understanding: It's About Relationships

Home is the circle of interconnectedness in Indigenous worldviews.

For example, they are described in Cree and Michif as *miyo* wahkootawin (kinship networks), in Lakota as *mitakuye oyasin* (All My Relations), and in Inuktitut as *ilagiit* (kindred).

- 8) Escaping or Evading Harm Homelessness
- 9) Nowhere to Go Homelessness
- 10) Emergency Crisis Homelessness
