
Homelessness and home insecurity is a problem in rural Alberta too, although it's often not s visible as it is in urban areas, a new study has found. AL CHAREST / Postmedia

Homelessness is pervasive even outside of Alberta's urban centres, according to a new study into the scope of the problem in the province's rural communities.

The report is touted by the Alberta Rural Development Network (ARDN) as the largest co-ordinated count of homelessness and housing instability ever completed in rural Alberta, and was completed in co-ordination with local service agencies operating in 20 communities.

- Sleeping rough or camping
- Living in vehicles or abandoned buildings
- Sleeping in emergency shelters
- Couch surfing
- Staying in inadequate and unsafe housing
- Indigenous Homelessness (Thistle, 2017)

## A GENDERED APPROACH TO ESTIMATING RURAL, REMOTE, AND INDIGENOUS HOMELESSNESS

Violence is the leading cause of Women's Homelessness in Canada.

#### Rural Women's Shelters face challenges such as:

- Larger service areas
- Less staff and higher turnover
- Less access to court protection
- Higher staff burnout
- Smaller budgets
- Competitive funding
- More reporting



I live in accommodations provided by my employer
I live in a home that is owned by/rented out by an Indigenous government
I find it difficult to pay rent
I spend more than 30% of my monthly income on housing
I live in housing that needs major repairs (heating or plumbing problems, mould, leaky roof, etc)
There are not enough bedrooms for the number of people in the home I'm in
I live in a different community from where I work due to housing shortage
I live in supported or transitional housing (e.g. Housing First)
I stayed in a medical/detox facility
I slept in a family's/friends home because I had no where else to stay
I stayed in a jail/prison/remand centre
I stayed at a women's/domestic violence shelter
I stayed with someone I didn't know because I had no other place to go

I stayed in a home with unsafe conditions (e.g. exposed wiring, no railing on banisters, physical construction hazards, etc.)
I endured unwanted sexual activity to have a place to stay
I stayed in living situation unwillingly because I had no other choice (e.g. with parents due to lack of rental options)
I slept in a shelter
I slept in a makeshift shelter, vehicle, tent, or shack
