HSBV is a community-based organization with the mission to:

- Support and advocate for individuals who are without shelter
- Provide low barrier emergency shelter that has few requirements for entry
- Provide shelter and programs, especially during coldest months of the year
- Build trust to facilitate individuals' access to the local system of care



> 61% of which were employed




Rural Development Network: 2023 Service Needs Estimation Project

Emergency Winter Shelter

- Low-barrier, emergency winter shelter
- Harm reduction focused
- 5-6 guests/night can be accommodated
- 2 staff present during use

2022–2023 Emergency Shelter Operating Season





Who is accessing the emergency winter shelter?

A total of 7 voluntary demographic surveys were completed across the operating period and revealed that of all participants:

71⁰/₀ Identified as Caucasian **29%** Identified as First Nations **86%** Between the ages of 36-55 **14**% Between the ages of 56-64




Online Community Partner survey distributed to gather suggestions and feedback about our programs, 5 responses:




