

Online Submission Tool – Encampment Review

- 366 submissions – 313 from individuals / 53 from organizations



What We Heard: Human Rights Concerns

HOMELESSNESS
CRISIS

- Barriers to secure housing
- The homelessness crisis for Indigenous Peoples
- Inadequate program funding for community services
- The need for human rights-based action and more accountability
- Inadequate emergency shelters

ENCAMPMENTS

- Encampment evictions and clearances
- Violence, stigma, increased isolation and risk of harm
- Unmet basic needs of encampment residents
- Gendered experiences in encampments
- Safety and security risks in encampments alongside peer support
- Absence of services and supports

What We Heard: Potential Solutions

1. Ensure human rights-based action and greater accountability
2. Meaningfully engage with encampment residents
3. Treat encampment residents with dignity and respect
4. Uphold the rights of Indigenous Peoples
5. Provide for encampment residents' basic needs
6. Uphold encampment residents' right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental
7. Improve encampment safety and security for all residents
8. Prioritize long-term right to adequate housing solutions
9. Improve emergency shelter conditions and access
