Project intention:

To support individuals experiencing chronic homelessness who rough sleep

- Work closely with our City partnerships (Calgary Bylaw) who are highly knowledgeable about location of encampments in the city and high-traffic camp areas
- Increase public safety, and provide greater outcomes by reducing displacement for individuals experiencing homelessness

Program objectives



- 1. Improving crisis triage
 - Goal: immediate safety, better responses times, public call response
- 2. Integrated case management
 - Goal: meaningful relationships based on trust, proactive engagement
- 3. Non-emergency support by outreach services
 - Goal: better availability of support services by social service agencies where individuals need them, better connection to social support for those sleeping rough

Program Participant Target

Individuals and couples rough sleeping / experiencing homelessness

Adults

Individuals who have no dependents in their care

Youth

Unaccompanied youth ages 13-24 years

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Referral Process

- Goal: low barrier access to ensure ease of information transfer and quick response
- Designed to receive referrals by
 - concerned citizens
 - Calgary Police Services
 - Calgary Fire Department
 - EMS
 - Calgary 211 (provincial helpline)
 - Partner agencies




Data Snapshot

Tracking data collection

- Severe winter conditions
- Emergency planning

- Proactive weather response and high-risk behavior minimization
 - Survival supplies and basic needs
- Client care
 - Welfare checks

- Needle debris





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


Outreach Case Management

Case Management Interventions

- Connecting to Shelter programs / mobile shelter options
- Coordinated Access and Assessment committee
 - Complete Housing assessments (Needs and Services Questionnaire)
 - Transport clients to program intakes and assessments
 - Treatment/ Recovery coordination and programming options (referral and connection)
 - Family reconnection
 - Identification and funding applications
 - Diversion supports
- Education on risk minimization in camps
 - Fire prevention and collaboration with CFD Health care supports on site or by referral
 - Needle debris education and disposal







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Case Management Interventions cont.

- High Risks behaviors
 - Safety planning, hoarding and fire prevention, and harm reduction supports
 - Basic needs programs hot drinks, warm clothing, survival supplies

Outreach programs rely on donations and grants to support individuals with basic necessities for safety when rough sleeping





Case Management Interventions cont.

- Justice supports
 - Transport to legal obligations
 - Access to bus tickets and passes
 - Legal guidance assistance
- Access medical support:
 - COVID-19 assessments and testing
- Mental health on site
 - Mobile technology offers access at encampment
 - Transport to appointments
 - Nursing staff attending sites






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Community engagement + Public education = Reduction in displacement
