
#### The Vision

# WAG STORY: ENTRY INTO HOMELESSNESS AND STREET INVOLVED SEX WORK



#### SLWAR STORY: HOMELESSNESS AND STREET INVOLVED SEX WORK

- i 48 women housed currently
- Average age group of a SLWAR participant: 30-39 (at intake almost half of women were in this age group)
- 87% of women had children at intake
- 0% had children in their care at intake
- 94% of participants had experienced homelessness for 6 months or more, on average 5 years or more
- Average age street involved sex work began: 19
- Youngest age street involved sex work began: 13
- Length of time engaged in street involved sex work: 7 years or more

All of the participants are considered "hidden homeless": couch surfing, staying with friends or Johns in order to have a place to sleep.

#### SLWAR STORY: HOUSING

- 100% of SLWAR participants secured permanent housing with supports in the private market
- Length of time to secure housing on average was 0-29 days from the point of intake
- i 44% remained in their initial housing
- 56% required a rehousing, of this 68% of participants were re housed within 0-1 days which means they did not have to reenter homelessness before getting housed again
  - Top reason for rehousing is a landlord conflict (ie. Guest management)
  - 87% of participants required support to address a landlord conflict or tenancy concern
- SLWAR is currently working with 26 different landlords across the city

#### SLWAR STORY: HOUSING CONTINUED...

- City of London
  - investment in building and implementing the plan and commitment to permanent annualized funding
  - Housing allowances to all participants
- Housing stability Bank
  - Program which supports with first and last months rent as well as hydro arrears
- All star Housing Finder: background in housing development
- Partnership to London Hospitals and Elgin Middlesex Detention Centre (maximum security jail)
  - Collaborative approach to discharges and releases to try and ensure participants are not entering homelessness from institutions

#### SLWAR STORY: HOUSING CONTINUED ...

- Whatever It Takes Fund
- In home support is seen as the pillar to long term housing stability
- Goals are woman-led
- Rehousing is seen as an opportunity to learn and grow, not a failure
- All hands on deck approach to moves

### WAG STORY: ACTIVE ADDICTION



#### SLWAR STORY: SUBSTANCE USE

- 100% were using substances at the time of intake
- Prior to entering SLWAR, 87% were not accessing any form of substance use treatment
- After entering SLWAR, 82% of participants accesses substance use treatment
- 95% of participants have continued to use substances during their time in SLWAR, 67% of those women have decreased their overall use and are using safer practices

#### SLWAR STORY: SUBSTANCE USE CONTINUED

- The top 5 most commonly used substances were:
  - i 1. Methamphetamines
  - i 2. Opiods
  - 3. Cannabis
  - 4. Alcohol
  - <sub>i</sub> 5. Cocaine

Please note: making change regarding using substances is not a requirement for participating in the program. SLWAR operates on a harm reduction basis and all goals are participant led only.

#### SLWAR STORY: SUBSTANCE USE CONTINUED

- Addiction Services of Thames Valley is the host agency
  - i Heartspace
  - Reallocation an addictions outreach worker who also offers housing support
- Partnership to 2 community Physicians offering opiate safe supply
  - Staff support to daily methadone and suboxone as well
- Encourage use of and will provide transportation to safe injection site
- Partnership to Regional HIV/AIDS Connection
  - Built in outreach support- delivery and pick up of harm reduction materials once participants are housed
- Partnership to Elgin Middlesex Detention Centre
  - Collaborative approach with healthcare team to manage potential withdrawal upon release from incarceration

#### WAG STORY: LEGAL INVOLVEMENT



#### SLWAR STORY: LEGAL INVOLVEMENT

- 38% had a criminal charge at intake
- 45% of women were currently on probation at intake
- 55% of SLWAR participants did not obtain any new charges during their time in the program

#### SLWAR STORY: LEGAL INVOLVEMENT

- According to SLWAR participants, their legal involvement has reduced since being in the program
  - Receive support to attend probation and court appointments
- Accompaniment of Sgt Amy Birtch to court appointments to support with advocacy and avoidance of reentering system
- Letters of support from program to courts

## WAG STORY: RESTORING SAFETY



#### SLWAR STORY: RESTORING SAFETY

- First and foremost, we believe in women's autonomy.
  - The definition of safety is different for every woman
  - May differ depending upon factors such as: race, income, position on the sex work spectrum, disability, status in Canada, sexual orientation, among others
- 43% of women continued in sex work and 46% of women continued in street involved sex work with safer practices
  - Offer cell phones
  - Women will work from home with regular Johns they know well
  - Women will work on street but close to their home so they can take rest breaks

#### SLWAR STORY: RESTORING SAFETY

- 100% secured permanent housing with support
  - Complete lock changes whenever required
  - Repair broken windows
  - Program will provide door and/or window alarms
  - i Alarm system
  - i Crisis and safety planning
- Connection to Sgt Amy Birtch
  - Assists with guest management
  - Domestic violence concerns
  - Bad dates

#### SLWAR PARTNERSHIPS: HONORABLE MENTION

- i Partnerships to Psychiatry
  - Support women in need of long term care regarding their mental wellness
  - 'In the moment' support for women experiencing crisis
  - Frontline staff have daily contact with social worker and psychiatrist
  - Support to appointments for outpatient care and in home support
  - Quick referrals can be made through weekly leadership call
- Partnerships to Canadian Mental Health Association
  - Reallocated staff to provide in home housing support as well referrals to services related to mental wellness

- Connection to Indigenous specific services
  - Atlohsa Native Family Healing Services
  - i Okaadenige
  - Southwest Ontario Aboriginal Health Access Centre
- Partner to Giwetashkad, Indigenous Homeless Prevention Plan

#### SLWAR PARTNERSHIPS: HONOURABLE MENTION

- Trauma informed services
  - Counselling supports
  - Training to staff
- Violence Against Women sector
  - i Shelter support
  - Counselling supports
